Next, we are open to Questions and Answers; an opportunity for someone who has a woodworking problem to bring it before others who m ay have had the same problem.


Finally, we have the speaker for the evening. We have had some excellent ones and a great verity. This meeting speaker is excellent. Hope to see you there.

Our speaker for this month will be Tom Law. Tom was our first speaker 3 years ago when the club was first organized. He will give a brief overview on saw sharpening. He has produced a video on the subject and is the best place for som eone looking for any type of saw (except from Japan). He will then go into general sharpening and som e sound principles. He will be open to questions and answers. You m ay bring any item that needs to be sharpened and he will either sharpen it if tim e allows or at least give you exact instructions on how to do it yourself.

This is a very important meeting. The very first subject that should be taught in woodworking is sharpening!!!

The speaker last m onth was Mr. Tim Diener. Tim has been a designer at Lancaster County Tim ber Frames for the last 2 ½ years. He showed a slide presentation on the construction of a Tim ber Frame building. Tim said that most of the Timber Frame homes now days are hybrid in that they are Timber Frame and regular construction com bined Most of the wood used in Tim ber Frames is Douglass Fir. He talked about the different types of construction depending upon where the house or building is located. Tim closed his presentation by showing us some of the CAD drawings that he has produced.

WOODWORKING TIP

Accurate Measur ements for Woodworking

Accuracy is key in woodworking. Taking time to measure and mark lengths correctly will save a lot of heartache in the long run, as well-measured projects tend to fit together better and look a lot nicer after finishing.

When measuring boards or marking drilling locations with a tape m easure or ruler, start your measurement at the one-inch m ark rather than at the very end of the m easuring tape or ruler. Don't forget to add an inch on the other end of the length to account for starting one inch off. The ends of tape measures and rulers take a lot of abuse in the wood shop, and as a result, the ends are often warped, stretched, torn, dented or otherwise inaccurate. Moving in one inch to begin your measurements allows you to bypass m ost potential inaccuracies, so you'll get a more precise measurement for your project.








John Marsh made this dust extractor for his Delta saw. It is held in place by magnets.
