THIS MONTH'S MEETING



LAST MONTH'S MEETING



Our speaker last m onth was Mr. Jim Leamy. Jim gave an excellent talk on how he makes reproduction of old one of a kind hand planes.

Jim started collecting planes from the 1800's about 25 years ago. It became more difficult to find these planes and a lot more expense to buy them in the last few years. So about 10 years ago he decided to start making reproductions of the planes. There are no plans on how to make these planes so Jim creates his own plans working from photos.

When collectors started to see his work at the tool collectors shows everyone wanted one. Jim now has about a 15-month backlog for orders. Jim estimates that he has made about 200 planes in the last 10 years. Jim makes many of the tools that he needs to make his planes. He uses many different exotic woods along with Ivory to create his planes. TABLE SAW SAFETY

Here are a few very important table saw safety tips.

- Do not ever reach over the saw blade to pick up a
 piece of stock even if the guard is in place. Walk
 around the saw and pick up the piece of stock.
 There is too much danger that the stock can catch
 the blade and pull y our hand back into the saw. I
 have seen this happen.
- 2. Stand either to the right or the left of the blade when operating the saw, never directly in line with the blade. Anything that gets thrown back from the blade very likely will be traveling back towards the operator in line with the blade. It has been calculated that stock can travel at the speed of a bullet when thrown back from a rotating saw blade.
- 3. Cut any piece that is square or nearly square with the miter gauge or with a supporting jig. Pieces that are not square or nearly square when cut off between the square and the fence exert a pressure point diagonally between the fence and the blade and can bind between the fence and the blade causing the stock to be thrown back towards the operator.
- Always use push sticks, feather board and holding devices to keep your fingers away from the blade and always pay attention to what you are doing.




