PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

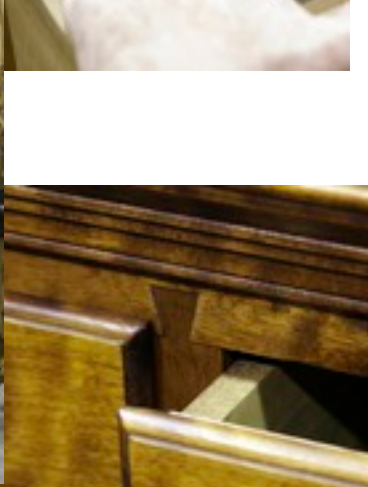

TOYS FOR TOTS * UPDATE YORK HOSPITAL



Child life specialist, Nancy Orwick was very pleased to receive the toys that I contributed to the York Hospital Pediatrics Department. The two board games and three jig saw puzzles with cases will be distributed age appropriately to hospitalized children. "Thank you for caring enough to share" and "Woodworking is your talent" she wrote.

Making toys is part of my woodworking entertainment, there is the challenge to design the project for the needs of the children and learning new processes in woodcraft. The board game "push a penny" is a table top game of shoving pennies or penny-sized washers into scoring areas. I added a storage tray to the back stop so the children could keep the scoring pegs and washers with the game and added a lid with a sliding dove tail (see sample photo).

There are very strict standards for sanitizing all toys. They must be thoroughly finished in order to be cleanable. The spread of infections in hospitals must be contained. Making jig saw puzzles that are sealed on all sides and are attractive in color is a challenge.

A suggestion for solid colored objects is to seal with shellac then spray with fast drying enamel. Shading, toning and layering colors can be achieved with layers of the spray. If multicolored toys and designs are desirable, artist paint can be used. Prime with a white latex paint. Trace the pattern on the wood. Purchase the small jars of water based paints in the colors you need. This paint is not durable, so when dry seal with a coat of varnish.

If you wish to donate your creative toys, you may take them to the hospital directly. First, call Pediatrics at 717.851.2387 and ask for Kathy Frank or Nancy Orwick to indicate when you can deliver them. She will tell you to leave them at the main entrance, information desk, where the toys will be picked up. Be sure to place a note on them with the destination (Pediatrics) and your name and address.
